

# The Altar Inventory

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## PREFACE

### A Place of Presence

The altar was never meant to be a place of pressure; it was always meant to be a place of presence. Before God asks you to offer anything, He first invites you to see, because most of us do not realize what has drifted onto the altar of our inner life until the Spirit gently reveals it. The Altar Inventory is not an examination of failure but a moment of clarity—a moment where the Spirit uncovers what has begun to clutter the place meant for communion, devotion, and holy surrender. Throughout Scripture, every genuine move of God began with an altar being rebuilt, cleansed, or re-ordered: Abraham returned to the altar; Elijah repaired it stone by stone; Israel rebuilt it after exile; and Jesus called us to become a living altar—a life fully offered. Your inner world functions the same way.

The Altar Inventory is a simple, quiet practice designed to help you recognize what has taken God's place, remove what should not be there, restore what has fallen off, and make space again for the fire of His presence. There is no shame in this process—only invitation, only clarity, only the gentle honesty that precedes fresh fire. When you begin, come slowly. Ask Him to show you what He sees, and allow this inventory to become the first step in rebuilding the altar of your life.

## ALTAR INVENTORY

A simple check of what is on your inner altar right now.

Come quietly.

Come honestly.

Lay your heart before the Lord and ask:

**What have I placed on the altar that He never asked for?**

(burdens, people, expectations, false responsibility)

**What have I taken off the altar that He DID ask for?**

(surrender, trust, forgiveness, obedience)

**What is cluttering the altar that needs to be removed?**

(voices, distractions, opinions, mixture)

**What is missing from the altar that needs to be restored?**

(worship, stillness, covenant, devotion)

Sit with the Spirit. Let Him point — not shame, but reveal.

When He shows you one thing, speak it out loud and release it to Him.

**This is the beginning of consecration:**

**seeing what sits on the altar and yielding it.**
